

Farmsteads and the Historic landscape

Past meetings of our Heritage Conference have inevitably touched on the subject of farmsteads in our investigations of the historic landscape of East Devon. It is impossible to study the tithe maps without being conscious of these farmsteads, invariably surrounded by orchards. Orchards were of course the focus of our attention last year.

In narrowing the focus to farmsteads this year we hope to tease out the relationship, past and present, that these historic buildings, many of them listed, have with their surroundings. Our premise is that the architectural features of farmhouses, farmyards and farm buildings will not only reflect the availability of local building materials and the durability of local building traditions, and styles, but will also tell us something about land-use, farming regimes and the wider landscape.

Although historic farmsteads are still with us in the landscape, many have lost their original function; hence we will also be looking at the experience of living in a converted farmhouse, farmhouse conversions and the importance of farm buildings to wildlife. As in previous years we also hope to contextualise our subject at a regional, national and even European level.
