Deep regret is felt at the news of the death in action in N.W. Europe of Lance-Corpl. Henry T. F. Fooks, elder son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Fooks, of Long Chimney Farm. He was 23 years old and had been serving for three years, prior to which he was a valued member of the Branscombe Home Guard Platoon. He was an old scholar of Branscombe C.E.
